A Letter From the Pastor

“Love is patient, love is kind, it isn’t jealous, it doesn’t brag, it isn’t arrogant or rude, it doesn’t seek its own advantage, it isn’t irritable, it doesn’t keep a record of complaints, it isn’t happy with injustice, but is happy with the truth. Love puts up with all things, trusts in all things, hopes for all things, endures all things. Love never fails... Now faith, hope, and love remain—these three things—and the greatest of these is love.” (1 Corinthians 13:4-8)

Ah, Love. Is there anything more wonderful, more fulfilling, more demanding? It’s February, and like it or not, this month we’ll be surrounded by images of Valentines, hearts, flowers, stuffed animals, jewelry, and chocolates all reminding us to celebrate love. And while there’s nothing inherently wrong with that, I think it misses the mark.

It reduces “LOVE” to a one-dimensional expression of something which is so much bigger, so much more amazing, and available to all – regardless of romantic relationship status.

In the Church we proclaim that God IS Love. But sometimes that’s hard to comprehend. We can understand what it feels like to love and to be loved by someone. But as humans, it’s challenging to grasp what an entire BEING that IS love might be like. Which is why we need Jesus. God’s love embodied. “For God so loved the WORLD, that God sent God’s only Son that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save

the world through Him.”

Jesus showed us what love looks like, acts like, forgives like. Jesus came so that we might know that we are loved and not condemned. Jesus came to invite us to share that love. And Jesus showed us that love is not always easy. It often demands that we put aside our own wants and wishes for the good of others.

Which brings us to our Scripture – the most famous “love passage” found in the Bible, which, believe it or not, was NOT written about romantic love. It helps to remember that Paul wrote these words to a church that was acting in exact opposition to these ideals. He wrote in a time of great conflict and drama. He wasn’t romanticizing love – he was demanding *agapè* (God’s unconditional, grace-infused, merciful love), telling the church – those who knew the love of God firsthand—to grow up and start acting as if God’s love makes a difference.

Friends, we live in a time that in many ways is similar to that of the Corinthian church. There are so many folks who are impatient, who are unkind, who are jealous, arrogant, rude, and braggarts. We see so many who are selfish, irritable, who keep score. Our world is filled with folks who couldn’t care less about justice or facts or Truth. And, we know people who don’t put up with much, who don’t trust in much, who have lost hope, who have checked out. It may be tempting to give in and join them.

God’s word implores us to not let ourselves fall into that way of being. God’s love

reminds us that how we live, speak, act, believe matters. Our attitudes matter. Our way of being has the ability to communicate God’s love to a world that needs it now more than ever.

Next month we’ll begin the journey of Lent once again, and we’ll see what real love – perfect love – looks like. In Jesus, we’ll witness passion and affection. We’ll see pity for people in need. We’ll behold the kind of love Paul talks about embodied. And in the end, we’ll experience love in the form of stunning self-sacrifice, even for His enemies.

Embraced by that kind of love, we are free to love one another (and even our enemies) in genuine, costly, meaningful ways. God bless you this month as we give thanks for the gifts of love all around us – most of all, the gift of love that is ours forever in Jesus!

So, this Valentine’s Day remember: God is Crazy About You! And God wants you to live in such a way that shows you believe it – for yourself and for the wider world around us. (Even and especially when none of us deserve it.)

Book Study



CALLING OUR TEENS – TRIENNIUM IS STILL HAPPENING IN JULY 2022!


